Bio Corner Notes, by Somirah

When I was growing up, there wasn't really any teachers or people in my school teaching me growth mindset. They didn't tell me how failure doesn't mean you'll always fail and it doesn't mean that YOU'RE a failure. It's just a setback to get over. I've always found reading difficult. There wasn't really a space to work at my pace and learning style. Being in a big school in a big community where a lot of children also need help, I was slipping through the cracks. It was their pace or nothing. Because I never found my learning style, I just assumed I could never learn to read.

When I started to research and look into finding an adult reading program, I still wasn't sure if I would be able to accomplish my goal. I Googled "how do adults learn to read." I started reading about other people succeeding from all types of backgrounds, and they all achieved the same goal I wanted. Reading their stories inspired me. After so long carrying that fixed mindset with me, I slowly started to believe I have what it takes to grow.

Calling the OC Read program was me overcoming the mindset of "I cannot do it." Just reading the stories might have inspired me, but when I finally called and spoke with the staff, that's what really gave me confidence because of how knowledgeable, helpful, and kind they were. I started to realize with help, practice, and determination, I can achieve anything I want even if it's hard in the beginning. I'll still probably run into challenges along the way, but if I keep working at it, I'll become more confident and able to achieve any goal I set.

CommonLit

CommonLit's library includes online books and short stories that can be filtered by genre, grade level equivalency/Lexile range, and theme. This is a perfect resource if your learner wants to read broadly but struggles to identify topics to read about!

CommonLit's texts are a mix of fiction and nonfiction titles, that cover topics like geography, history, and science, just to name a few. Click on the Sample Lessons links to the right to check out three different free stories you may want to try using with your learner.

Activities are included with each story and range from guiding and assessment questions to discussion prompts.

No account is needed to use CommonLit, though some materials may require you to create a free account in order to access them. If you need help creating an account, give us a call and we'll schedule you for a Device Advice session with one of OC Read's librarians.

What's the Matter with grade Levels?

It can be tempting to assign grade levels to your learner's skills, but this is a big "no" when it comes to adult learning. Grade levels do not apply to adults because we are not in the K-12 school system and real-world materials are not written according to grade-level requirements.

Adult new readers should never be constrained to reading materials that are "level appropriate". Any text can be level appropriate with the right amount of support from a tutor.

One of the biggest hurdles for adult new readers is gaining enough confidence in their own skills to tackle a "real" book. Show your learner that they can read more than they think they can with techniques like echo reading, duet reading, and other support-based activities.






